Last week we celebrated World Book Day and the children enjoyed dressing up as their favourite book characters, sharing their passion for books, and completing some exciting STEM activities linked to stories.

We have also been extremely pleased to see how well the Year1 children in Matisse class have adapted to the changes to their learning environment in their new classroom alongside the other Year 1 children.

Congratulations to Picasso class in Year 5 who performed their class assembly to their parents and carers this morning. Even though they were nervous they were amazing, and were able to confidently share their learning from last term. As part of world book day Matisse class shared the story of the three billy goats. They used their creative and inquiry STEM skills to explore making boats for the goats to cross the river out of different materials. They found out that the best boats were made from cups and plates because they floated on the water.















For World Book Day, Monet looked at the Roald Dahl book 'The



Twits'. They used their observation and inquiry STEM skills to investigate what made apples rot the fastest. They placed apple slices into vinegar, salt water and lemon juice to compare them over a number of days. They concluded that the vinegar made the apple rot the fastest, where as the salt water helped preserve the apple!















Yesterday, in Math's, Mondrian class used their creativity and flexibility skills to practise counting in 10s. As we had learned about coins and notes last week, we decided to use 10p coins to help us count in 10s





Year 5 have been using their observation and inquiry skills to learn about the properties of materials in Science this week. In English, we have been learning about 'Author Intent', using the acronym P.I.E which stands for Persuade, Inform and Educate. We have been reading sections of the book and collaborating to figure out how Isabel Thomas is trying to persuade, inform and educate us about the perils of rubbish!







To celebrate World Book Day, Year 6 read a description of the sweet room from Charlie and the Chocolate Factory. After this, they used their STEM skills (collaboration and observation) to find out whether skittle colours would react quicker in warm or cold water. They investigated this using a fair test format, ensuring that we only had one variable.

#### **Water Bottles**

Please remember to provide a water bottle for your child and send it in with them every day. It's really important for children to drink water during the day because:

- Water helps in maintaining the balance of fluids in our body. Growing children should drink adequate amount of water so that their basic body functions, like creation of saliva, blood circulation, proper digestion, maintaining the body temperature and more, perform well.
- Water also aids in energizing the muscles. Besides maintaining the balance of body fluids, it helps to strengthen the muscles and overcome muscle exhaustion. Children are often into many physical activities which make them exhausted. So, it's vital for them to drink water.
- Water assists kidneys to function properly. Drinking adequate amount
  of water helps the kidneys to work towards cleaning and flushing out
  toxins from our body. Children often complain about constipation;
  drinking enough water can help them in maintaining normal bowel
  function.



## Safer School Streets come to Plymouth

What's different about this street leading to Elburton Primary? Usually it would be busy with school run traffic and lined with parked cars...

During National Road Safety Week in November 2021, six Plymouth schools closed their streets to motor traffic and opened them up to walking, cycling and scooting in six one-day trials of Plymouth's first Safer School Streets pilot scheme, delivered in partnership between Sustrans, Plymotion and Plymouth City Council's Road Safety Team.

The schools that took part were Mary Dean's CoE Primary, Ernesettle Community School, Whitleigh Community Primary School, Stuart Road Primary School, Elburton Primary School and St Paul's RC Primary School.

A Safer School Street is where a road outside a school temporarily closes to school run and through motor traffic during drop off and pick up times, but maintains vehicle access for residents, parents and children with disabilities, emergency services, deliveries and other service vehicles. This opens the street up to families on foot, bicycle or scooter, making it safer to travel actively to school.

Councillor Jonathan Drean, Cabinet Member for Transport, said: "Now more than ever we need to encourage people to leave their cars at home for short journeys and to look at travelling by foot, blke and bus. One of the main ways of helping people choose to travel actively is to provide a safe space to do it in, and that's what a Safer School Streets scheme can deliver. Safer School Streets is also an innovative way of tackling some of the many problems brought about by school run traffic including conflict between motorists and other vulnerable road users, problem parking and resident access issues."

The Safer School Streets days were positively received by residents, teachers and parents; one parent at Elburton Primary said "It was an utter joy to walk up Haye Road South without having to check every two seconds over my shoulder for a car coming".



#### Plymouth active travel news roundup

The latest round of **Workplace Travel Grants** is open for applications! Businesses are being offered the opportunity to bid for match-funded grants of up to £25,000 to pay for measures that help staff travel more sustainably to, from and at work.

Launched in October 2020, the programme has already benefitted 36 companies, with more than £430,000 in grants and business contributions being invested in schemes that encourage more trips to be made by sustainable transport. Improved shower facilities, cycle parking, electric vehicle charge points and staff pool bikes are just some of the measures funded so far.

A 400-strong fleet of hireable electric bikes will be ready and available on the streets of Plymouth next year. The bikes, which will be based all across the city and will be bookable online, are being introduced as part of the Council's mobility hubs project.

The **Plymotion on Your Doorstep** team is out and about in the Southway area offering travel advice and incentives to encourage residents to try different modes of travel most relevant to them. Look out for them on a street near you, or visit their drop in session at Southway Library on Saturday 12 March, 10am - 1pm



### Sustrans Big Walk and Wheel is the new Big Pedal

The event has a new name but it still has the same aim we want to encourage more families to travel to school actively, to help create healthier and happier communities.

Sustrans Big Walk and Wheel will run for 10 days from 21 March to 1 April 2022 and is open to all primary and secondary schools in the UK

On each day of the challenge schools compete to see who can record the greatest number of pupils walking, using a wheelchair, scooting or cycling to school, with fabulous prizes on offer every day for schools taking part.

## Engines Off for Clean Air campaign goes city-wide!

Over 30 Plymouth schools are now taking part in our Engines Off for Clean Air campaign that was launched back in October 2021. The high profile launch held at Mary Dean's Primary and Ernesettle Community School was attended by Councillor Jonathan Drean, Cabinet Member for Transport, and Councillor Maddi Bridgeman, Cabinet Member for Environment and Street Scene, and was covered by BBC Spotlight!

Engines Off for Clean Air is all about encouraging people to pollute less when driving and focuses on reducing air pollution around schools by parking further away from school gates and switching engines off while waiting.

Air pollution is an issue that people are increasingly concerned about, especially around schools as children and young people are amongst the most affected. A recent YouGov survey for Sustrans showed that 49% of UK school children aged 6 to 15 were worried about air pollution near their school, an increase of 10 percentage points since a similar survey ran in 2018.

Schools that are taking part get a banner, car window sticker pack and plenty of digital resources and have been using them to design and run their own campaigns. The digital resources include a lesson plan, and the aim is to develop new lesson plans and resources regularly to keep the campaign rolling.
